#### Greeting:

The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, the love of Christ that guards our hearts and minds, and the joy and consolation of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.** 

Song:

## **Opening Prayer:**

Stir up our hearts, O God, to prepare a pathway for your Christ. By His coming speak peace to your people and turn our hearts toward you, that your saving grace and splendid glory, may dwell in all the earth; through Jesus Christ, whose day draws near. **Amen.** 

#### **Lighting of the Advent Wreath:**

Silence for reflection

We praise you, God, for this circle of light that marks our days of preparation for Christ's advent. As we light the candles on this wreath, kindle within us the fire of your spirit, that we may be light shining in the darkness. Enlighten us with your grace, that we may welcome others as you have welcomed us. Grand this through Christ our Lord, whose coming is certain and whose day draws near. **Amen.** 

The first & second Advent Candles are lit as we sing together:

Wait for the Lord, whose day is near.
Wait for the Lord; be strong, take heart!

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### **Scripture & Reflection:**

Darkness is Beautiful

The Song of Solomon is a love poem overflowing with rich imagery. It need not be explained as an allegory of Christ's love for the church but can simply stand as an expression of being overwhelmed by the beauty of another. While older translations of the Bible translate the conjunction in verse 5 linking "black" (or "dark") with "beautiful" (or "lovely") as one of contrast (that is, "I am dark, but lovely"), the NRSV joins them as two things that belong together ("I am black and beautiful"). The scholarship

behind this decision would seem to be reflected in what follows: "Do not gaze at me. Because I am dark, because the sun has gazed on me."

This may seem an unusual passage to meditate on during Advent. Yet many of the images of Christ and the virgin Mary we are accustomed to seeing this season portray them with light skin, as if from European descent. This can give the incorrect impression that Jesus was white—a belief that has been used to defend notions of white supremacy. This passage offers a helpful contrast that is also more historically accurate.

The refrain from a hymn for the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which identifies the woman in Song of Solomon with the virgin Mary puts it like this:

O Mother dark and lovely, hear the poor who come with their song; Lead them into Jesus' kingdom where they truly do belong.

A reading from Song of Solomon 1:2-6.

Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth! For your love is better than wine, <sup>3</sup>your anointing oils are fragrant, your name is perfume poured out; therefore the maidens love you. <sup>4</sup>Draw me after you, let us make haste. The king has brought me into his chambers. We will exult and rejoice in you; we will extol your love more than wine; rightly do they love you. <sup>5</sup>I am black and beautiful, O daughters of Jerusalem, like the tents of Kedar, like the curtains of Solomon. <sup>6</sup>Do not gaze at me because I am dark, because the sun has gazed on me. My mother's sons were angry with me; they made me keeper of the vineyards, but my own vineyard I have not kept!

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#### **Prayer**

Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, we pray the Prayer Jesus taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
