Scripture & Reflection:

Darkness Holds God

The entire story of Jesus' birth is enveloped in darkness. The Sovereign of the universe is conceived, nourished, and protected in the dark safety of Mary's womb. An angel visits Joseph in a nighttime dream, easing his doubts and fears around this unexpected pregnancy. The shepherds receive word from angelic choirs by night that the Savior has been born; the magi are led to him by a bright evening

star. And not long after his birth, Joseph and Mary flee under the protection of night to escape King Herod's slaughter of the innocents. Many assemblies hold their principal observance of Christmas the evening before by candlelight.

A reading from Matthew 1:18-24.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. ²⁰But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." ²²All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

²³"Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." ²⁴When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife,
