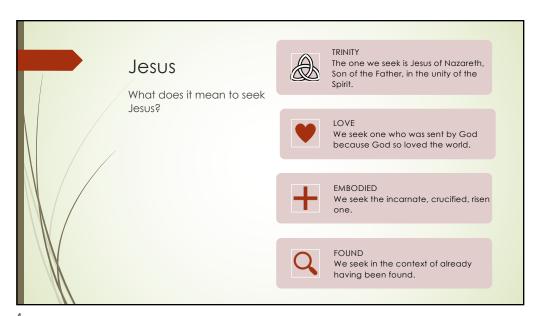


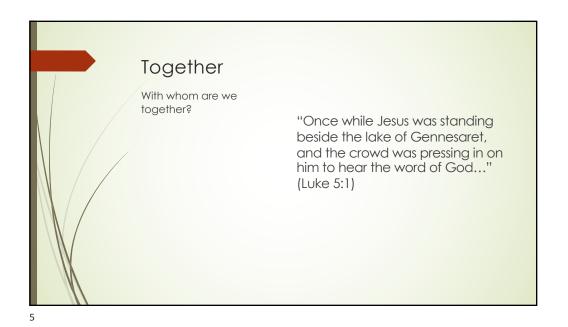

Seeking Jesus together, in worship, study, and service







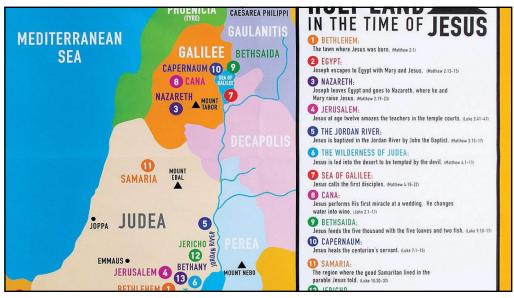

Luke 19:1 He entered Jericho and was passing through it. ² A man was there named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was rich. ³ He was trying to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was short in stature. 4 So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore tree to see him, because he was going to pass that way. 5 When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today." 6 So he hurried down and was happy to welcome him. 7 All who saw it began to grumble and said, "He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." 8 Zacchaeus stood there and said to the Lord, "Look, half of my possessions, Lord, I will give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will pay back four times as much." 9 Then Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because he too is a son of Abraham. 10 For the Son of Man came to seek out and to save the lost."

Excursus: Divine **Necessity** in Luke's Gospel

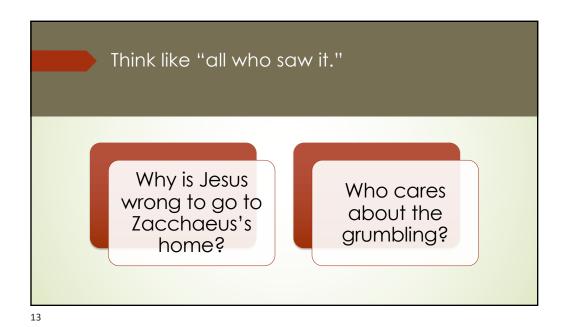
- 1. "Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" (2:49).
- 2. "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God to the other cities also; for I was sent for this purpose"
- 3. "The Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised" (9:22; see also 13:33, 17:25, 24:7).
- 4. "But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found" (15:32).
- 5. When Jesus came to the place, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down; for I must stay at your house today" (19:5).
- 6. "Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?" (Luke 24:26).

That's the armor everyone put on to pretend they had a purpose

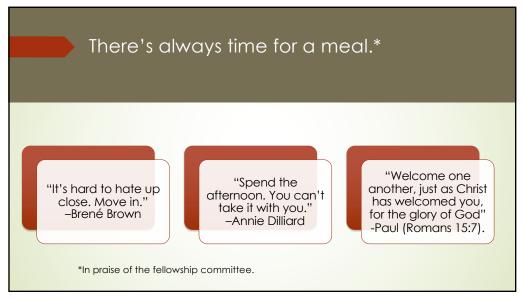
in the world.

Your plate is waiting.

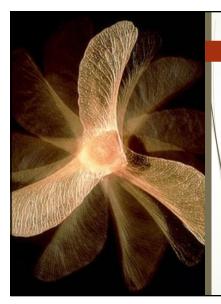
We will snip fresh mint
