This is the orientation edition! I am not at my site yet. We will move in next week. I've been living and learning with my cohort (Espen, Katie, Ashlyn, and Tim) and Hannah our country coordinator. Since we arrived, we have visited Phnom Penh landmarks, started language class and gotten to know our way around the city. Our routine is school in the morning and then coffee shops, running at Olympic Stadium, or general learning/getting things done in the afternoon.

Moving to Cambodia has been a physical (we are biking; it's hot!), mental (new language and culture), & emotional (~12 hr time difference) challenge. I'm *wondering* what are we, Christian volunteers, doing in this primarily Buddhist country? Why do these people care about Jesus? I am looking forward to *witnessing* the response of the residents of Rainbow Hostel's. Each Sunday I talk to a few more students with a little bit more Khmer. They are around my age, pursuing degrees like finance and accounting. They seem excited about sharing music and practicing English. I look forward to moving in and learning from them!

The Khmer Rouge

- Did you know around 500,000 tons of US bombs were dropped on Cambodia in the early 70s?
- Did you know that 2 years later a Communist regime took over and killed almost **1/4 of the Cambodian population?**

To be honest, I didn't before orientation. Over the course of three days we watched *The Killing Fields* movie, visited **Tuol Sleng** a high school turned torture prison that is now a museum, and **Choeung Ek Genocidal Center** or the Killing Fields, mass graves holding people of all ages. I had never been in places like these before. The feeling there is so heavy; I would rather never know the brutality of authoritarian systems. Nevertheless, they are a reality that must be confronted. As the narrators of the audio guides said, **genocides from around the world must be remembered** so we know to **resist** them.



Dear everyone I talked to before I left, The Cambodian language, **Khmer**, is NOT pronounced like "Come-here". It's much closer to "Come-eye".

See, I am learning so much! After the first day, it felt like my brain got run over by a tuk tuk. I was so tired! Now, a month in, with a few phrases under my belt I've managed a few fun exchanges in Khmer. The teachers at school are so nice! (thoughtful pedagogy, too) My classmates are from France, Korea, China, and Holland and have been in Cambodia anywhere from 8 years to one month. We help each other understand culture and try to catch every new bit of vocab we can. Our final assessment is (10/8-9) after a week long Pchum Ben holiday. We've gone on two field trips. One to a local market to barter in Khmer (see my "karot", pg.1) The other to learn more about the Pchum Ben holiday (see the attached video!)
