"Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint" - Isaiah 40.31 NRSVUE

When we are tired or weary and feel like fainting, God promises to revive us and to raise us up - with strength like that of an eagle's wings. This hope in God is sure and true because "The Lord is the everlasting God, the creator of the ends of the earth - who doesn't grow tired or weary." (Isaiah 40.28) All of creation - the waters of the earth, the night sky filled with stars, the dust of the earth, the mountains and hills - all creation reflects God's glory (Isaiah 40.12, 26). In God's great love and compassion for humanity, God gathers us all in loving arms, lifting us up onto God's lap (Isaiah 40.11). Who can compare with God!?!

In Isaiah 40, the prophet Isaiah shares a word of hope and promise with God's people who are living in exile. They were strangers in a strange land, perhaps forgetting the steadfast promises of God to be their God - always! Like God's people of old, we too sometimes forget God's abiding promise to be with us in Christ Jesus - always! God is our hope - always!

Come join **Maryn Olson**, the keynote speaker, as we will explore finding hope in the ruins. Over the past year, a new disaster occurred somewhere in the world every two to three days on average. Disasters and crises keep happening with increasing frequency and intensity due to the impacts of climate change. And in the midst of the chaos and suffering, Lutheran Disaster Response is present. LDR is how the church comes together to care for and walk with God's people in need wherever they are, for as long as it takes.

The Old Testament prophets all offer messages of hope for the future, but none more than the prophet Isaiah. Join **Rev. Bobby Morris** to explore how the hope found and proclaimed by Isaiah is grounded in the power of the Spirit.

Come join **Michael Benshish**, our music leader, as he invites us to use our musical gifts in musical reflections on these scriptures. If you are interested in singing in the choir or sharing your instrumental gifts, please indicate so on your registration form.

Maryn Olson, Keynote Speaker

Maryn Olson (she/her) serves as the Director for <u>Lutheran Disaster Response</u>, the humanitarian and crisis response ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). In this role, she oversees the LDR's global (international and domestic) grants and programs. Internationally, she collaborates closely with the ELCA area desks in responding to disasters; domestically, Maryn works with synods, social ministry organizations, community-based groups, and tribal nations. She also represents the ELCA in various settings with ecumenical partners.

Maryn has always had a strong sense of justice, and this passion motivates her work. She has 20 years of nonprofit experience and has served in a variety of disaster related roles. Maryn holds a Bachelor of Arts from Valparaiso University and a Master of Science (MSc) in Public Health in Developing Countries from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Maryn and her wife, Angela, live in St. Louis, MO.

The Rev. Bobby Morris, Bible Study Leader

Bobby Morris serves as pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church (ELCA) in Pomaria, S.C. and teaches Old Testament and Hebrew at the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary of Lenoir Rhyne University. He frequently contributes commentary to workingpreacher.org of Luther Seminary and has published technical work in Hebrew and Greek for the New Interpreter's Bible Commentary. He is also an adjunct faculty member with the Jerusalem Center for Biblical Studies and has travelled and taught in the Middle East since 1998. Bobby does some of his best theological reflection when on one of his many antique Allis Chalmers tractors, which he uses to tend the farm that has been in his family for nearly one-hundred years.

Michael Benshish, Musician

Michael Benshish (music leader) has been performing on the piano, organ, and synthesizer, primarily throughout the Chicago area and Southeast Virginia, as well as throughout the U.S. and internationally, since 1988. Currently, he is active as the Director of Worship and Music at Lutheran Church of the Master in Carol Stream, IL, a musician at St. Andrew Lutheran in Portsmouth, Virginia, a freelance collaborative pianist, band member/leader, and recording artist. Utilizing this rich variety of musical diversity, along with the blessing of gifted musicians, is Michael's favorite thing to incorporate into worship, with offerings ranging from Bach chorales to modern praise music and everything in between.

Building a Suicide Safer Community through Suicide Alertness for Everyone (safeTALK) - Rev. Carl Trost, Board Member, VA Chapter American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and Markita Madden-Puckett, Executive Director, Virginia Chapter American Foundation for Suicide Prevention



The LivingWorks safeTALK is a training that equips people to be more alert to someone thinking of suicide. In this training, you will learn how to reach out, help individuals at risk, and help keep them safe by promptly connecting them to further support. Using a simple yet effective model, LivingWorks safeTALK empowers everyone to make a difference. With over 120,000 people attending each year, it's the world's fastest-growing suicide prevention skills training course. This workshop will cover three sessions, and attendance will be required for each section to receive credit. CEU's are also available after the completion of this training.

A1 Lutheran Theology and Confessions: A Review for SAMs and an Intro for Everyone-Rev. Dr. Wesley Smith, Zion Waynesboro (3-part series)

As Christians, we confess Jesus Christ, we proclaim the Good News, and, as the church, we act on behalf of our neighbor. As Lutherans, we teach and preach these convictions in light of the cross. Over the course of three workshops, we will explore these foundations of Lutheran

preaching and teaching. (If you wish to take this course, you need to take all three sessions). Session A looks at how Law and Gospel inform how we stand before God; how we read the Bible; how we preach; how we live simultaneously as saint and sinner; and the necessity of self-critique.

A3 Can the "Unspeakable" Psalms Speak for Us? The Intercessory Power of the Spirit When Our Sighs Are Too Deep for Words - Rev. Bobby Morris, Bible Study Leader John Calvin described the Psalms as "An Anatomy of the Soul" because of their ability to connect with all manner of the human experience. Yet, we rarely, if ever, hear some of the most poignant texts of this ancient collection in the church. In this workshop, discover the Spiritual power of St. Athanasius' statement: "Most of Scripture speaks to us; the Psalms speak for us."



A4 Connecting with ELCA Advocacy and Coordinating a Letter Campaign in Your Congregation - Alex Parker, Advocacy Coordinator for ELCA Advocacy, Washington D.C. In this workshop, you will learn about the work of ELCA Advocacy, where we operate, how we operate, and how you can create change beginning in your congregation. After a brief presentation, participants will be guided through one impactful and easy form of advocacy that begins at home with your fellow congregants - coordinating on issues and writing letters to your members of Congress.

This workshop proposes to address in layman's terms how we have gotten to today's situation and what are some actions we can take as people, families, congregations, communities and Synods to make a difference. Dr. Bill will use his vast knowledge to help us as individuals to better understand how we got into the place we find ourselves. Sister Phyllis will explore ways that help us feel less like throwing our hands into the air and giving up.

However, smaller congregations must be more intentional about how they do these things to ensure longevity of their mission. 
